This week NGC President Brenda Moore and David Robison contacted me to confirm two clubs received PLANT AMERICA GRANTS. A Community Project Grants went to the Chapman Highway Garden Club in District IV and the Year 'Round Garden Club in District II. Congratulations to these two wonderful active clubs! I am so pleased many clubs have applied for grants and received them in 2023. Lola Eslick, TFGC Grant Chairman eslickla@aol.com continues to provide information and aid to those seeking grant opportunities. All the district directors submitted reports and I requested many chairman to add to this edition of The Volunteer Gardener so you can read about the many projects and successes that I had the pleasure of attending across the state. Blue and Gold Star Family Markers and Memorials were placed all over the state in 2023. It is so emotionally moving to represent TFGC at these events. Many clubs presented NGC Standard Flower Shows, which provide a great service to all who view and enjoy these shows. These are two things that set us apart from non-federated clubs.

Debbie Shaver, TFGC Award's Chairman has been a busy bee as always. Read her report in this issue. We will have an Awards Workshop in 2024. It is on the TFGC Calendar of Events.

I want to address one item that stood out on our president's report that is a way we can all participate in making Tennessee a cleaner, greener, healthier place to live,

Number 32 on the President's Report states- "Recycle Project (describe)." Many clubs left this blank. I want us all, in 2024 this spring when you meet for your meetings, maybe your roll call answer could be, "How I plan to recycle in Tennessee in 2024."

- 1. If we all try to bring our reusable bags every time we go grocery shopping, you as one person could reduce waste in your family. I leave my reusable bags in my car so I will always have them. Suppose you use five (5) bags a week, fifty-two (52) weeks in a year, that would be two hundred and sixty (260) bags a year. I think this is a very low figure for me personally, but it is based on a one-person household for an example. Say your club has 15 members, that is conservatively, 3,380 bags your club saved from the land fill. We all can do this! Fill that question 32 in this year.
- 2. Composting is recycling. I know most of you are composting. I have a friend; he goes to Star Bucks and picks up their coffee grounds to put on his lush dark green yard. I'm not going to drive around gathering other people's garbage, but good for him! I compost my coffee grounds, tea bags, wood ashes and banana peels directly onto my beds. My rabbits eat greens, fruits and vegetables. The horses eat corn cobs, fruits and vegetables, which my grandchildren love to feed them.

My chickens eat everything! You can eliminate so much green garbage by composting.

Then I use their manure, along with our cattle manure on my garden and flower beds.

These are two easy projects we can all help Tennessee reduce waste. Let's try and fill in that number 32 in 2024.

I will have an opportunity for every district to attend my Ways and Means Project in 2024.

"Herb Workshop" is an informational program for growing, cooking, designing and the uses of herbs in everyday life. I also have plant lists that I grow to keep deer away. I have never had a deer in my yard. Tickets are \$20.00 with \$5.00 donated back to your club. This includes a complimentary Herb Buffet Luncheon, Herb Booklet and opportunities for herb purchases.

"Designing for the Holidays" is a fall topiary, greens, wreaths, swags and designs to inspire you to get an early start with your holiday décor. Tickets are \$20.00 with \$5.00 donated back to your club. This includes a complimentary Holiday Buffet Luncheon, handout and opportunities for garden purchases.

TFGC Land Trust Project Cumberland Trail State Scenic Trail December 2023

Beginning in 2009 when Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs partnered with the Cumberland Trail State Scenic Trail Project there has been continuing support from our organization. To date, over \$30,000 has been donated by TFGC garden clubs to support the project. The Cumberland Trail is poised to make significant gains in trail progress in 2024. Land acquisition is moving forward as an important part of the project. The trailwill serve the adjoining communities, the state and the nation as a resource management area, a recreation area, a cultural institution as well as an educational institution. With this project the Cumberland Trail could become Tennessee's largest and most visited state park.

On April 30, 1971 then Governor Winfield Dunn signed a bill authorizing the Tennessee Trails System Act (TCA 11-11-104) creating the CTSST. Present at this signing among other dignitaries was Mack Pritchard, one of the founding fathers of the Cumberland Trail. Mack was the conservation conscience of Tennessee and served as Tennessee State Parks Naturalistsand first State Archaeologist. He was given credit for mapping the entire CTSST. The trail was designed for hikers by hikers as a sustainable single-file backcountry hiking trail. Imagine a foot trail traversing the mountain tops, river gorges, meadows and valleys of the Cumberland Plateau through eleven East Tennessee counties.

The 300-mile CTSST trail begins at Cumberland Gap National Historical Park in Claiborne County and ends at the Signal Mountain Unit of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park in Hamilton County. The project required cooperative management from State, Federal, private and community partnerships. TFGC partners with the Cumberland Trail and the National Park Service to provide financial support for land acquisition, trail development, native landscaping, and ecological and cultural and environmental protection projects.

During the fourteen years as TFGC CTSST co-chairmen, Linda Ford and Carole Whited have worked closely with CTSST Park Manager Bobby Fulcher. He has partnered with TFGC on many levels, including speaking at our Conservation Camps, District Meetings and TFGC conventions.

He entertained our groups with his banjo folk music and shared major trail plans with us. On a person note, Carole and Linda were meeting a few years ago with Bobby Fulcher at his Cove Lake State Park office to plan a kiosk at Carr Gap to recognize Alice Overton. On the return drive back to headquarters Bobby took a phone call. After the call he turned to us and said: "the trail has just received a 6000-acre land acquisition in a key area of the trail." Bobby was pleased that he took the call and could share good news with us.

Bobby retired as CTSST Park Manager in November 2023. Bobbyindicated he would be available to attend the TFGC District IV Meeting in March 2024 at Fox Den Country Club. This will give TFGC anopportunity to thank Bobby for supporting TFGC's project.

Since the trail was adopted as TFGC Land Trust Project in 2009 by then TFGC President Alice Overton, all subsequent TFGC Presidents (Valerie Tipps, Ann McCormick, Pamela Dowd, Cindy Hintz, Maggi Burns, Julie Wilson and Denise Thorne) have supported this project, along with TFGC garden club members who have donated thousands of dollars to trail development. The support received from grants, the Cumberland Trail Conference, Friends of the Cumberland, Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs, supporting agencies, volunteers and various State administrations through the years has led to the great progress that has been made to develop CTSST.


A major part of the trail development was done by the AmeriCorps team. This team worked to develop and maintain the trail, tirelessly, camping on ridge tops, sleeping in tents and working during daylight hours. They generally worked four 10-hour days followed by three days off. Volunteers, including college students on spring break and hiking enthusiasts, have completed many trail segments. The volunteers are a valuable asset to the organization. With a large majority of the Cumberland Trail built by volunteer labor, it is noteworthy that the completion of the trail cannot be done without the help of the community. Several hiking trail segments, totaling over 200 miles, are now completed and ready to hike. The terrain of remaining segments has proven to be a challenge, but trail crews are working hard to get the Cumberland Trail constructed in its entirety.

As the trail moves forward closer to its Hamilton County destination, let's move TFGC to the top of the support group of the CTSST with our continued contributions. Many garden clubs are making Land Trust a line item in their annual budgets. It is a good project for future generations to have the opportunity to experience such a remarkable part of our beautiful state of Tennessee by hiking the CTSST.

As I sit at my desk reflecting on District I events that have occurred since I and the Executive Board assumed our roles for the new biennium, I can say without a doubt that District I is a group of passionate, energetic gardeners making a difference in their communities.

District I held an NGC Standard Flower Show called "The Cowboy Way" at the Memphis Botanic Garden on May 24 open and free to the public. The event was intended to take the viewer back in time returning to the wild west to stimulate, educate and enjoy it all again with floral design, botanical arts, photography, education and horticulture. Mary Heim, flower show chairman, and her committee did an amazing job transforming the Memphis Botanic Garden into a magical space for participating clubs to display their entries showing off their creativity in design and skills in horticulture. It was an outstanding flower show enjoyed by all!

District I held its Presidents'-Treasurers' meeting on June 5th at the Memphis Botanic Garden. The event was well attended with current information from the TFGC website printed and distributed to presidents and treasurers for their notebooks. Bonnie Stockel, our featured speaker, presented a power point called "Leap into Leadership" which was fun and informative. During the meeting everything from NGC, Deep South, TFGC and District I themes and projects to Endowment Trust Fund Grants, a Racheff House History, Awards Book of Evidence and Vision of Beauty Calendars were covered. NGC convention awards were presented. At the end of the meeting after lunch in celebration of National Garden Week and for a District I project, attendees created five bucket kitchen gardens of herbs to be distributed to various fire stations throughout the district to say thank you to our fire stations for their service to our communities. We partnered with Sherwin Williams in Germantown who donated the buckets for the project and a friend of the District donated a flat of marigolds started from seed which were used for pest control and color. The fire stations were delighted to be honored for their service.

Our Fall Membership Meeting was held October 16th at the Memphis Botanic Garden which was the kickoff for our District's new biennium 2023-2025. We had a strong showing with 95 registered for the event with 85 attending. Denise Thorne, our TFGC State President, and Lelia Johnson, TFGC President-Elect, were to be our special guests but due to the passing of Denise's father, neither Denise nor Leila were able to attend .Our guest speaker ,Suzanne Irwin Askew, author of the book, Native Plants of Tennessee: A Book of Lists produced by the TFGC, Inc., was our keynote speaker delivering a program called "Finding, Propagating and Increasing Native Plants in Your Garden". Suzy's program was very informative and nicely complimented my theme, "Gardening with Native Plants", for this biennium. The beautiful fall table decorations were done by Kennedy View Garden Club members using plant materials from their gardens. The arrangements were sold as part of our Ways and Means project along with anOpportunity Drawing with items donated by local businesses, club members and Taunton Press, publisher of fine Gardening magazine. Barbara Armstrong and Sandy Jones from Suburban Garden Club created an outstanding American Traditional Mass NGC floral design for the lunch table not only as a decoration but as a visual teaching tool for our membership. Molly Hampton, our District I **Endowment Trust Fund Trustee, presented Endowment Trust Fund grant awards** to the four clubs in our District who applied for matching funds. Garden Club of Rosemark will be replacing numerous shrubs at the Historic Rosemark Telephone Exchange Museum due to the winter kill from the extreme winter conditions in December 2022. Germantown Garden Club is creating a seed library at the Germantown library with the objective of educating and enriching the community about the importance of gardening. A large bright red 30 drawer cabinet will be placed next to the circulation desk where a variety of seeds will be catalogued for library patrons to take home with planting instructions. Two librarians will oversee the checkout process tracking type and quantity of seeds selected. Scenic Hills Garden Club is replanting the neighborhood Whitney Street Scenic Hills Sign area. Cooper -Young Garden Club will work with homeowners and volunteers to make over select gardens along 3blocks in the Fox Meadows Neighborhood to show the powerful impact gardening can have on a community when everyone gets involved in adding flowers.

On Veterans Day, November 11, Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. District I in cooperation with Crockett County Veterans Memorial Association and Crockett County Government proudly sponsored the dedication of a Blue Star and Gold Star Families Memorial Marker on the Crockett County Courthouse lawn at 9:00 A.M. As District Director, I delivered greetings from Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs and from District I with a brief history of the NGC Memorial Marker Program. Phyllis Allen, Deep South Blue Star and Gold Star Memorial Markers Chairman, offered greetings from Deep South Garden Clubs and NGC Words of Dedication. District I provided a large grapevine wreath decorated with a fresh spray of flowers created by Holliday Flowers which was placed at the Gold Star Marker. The event was well attended with approximately 150 present. Lindy Register, Crockett County Veterans Service Officer, U.S. Navy did an excellent job organizing the event with keynote speaker, Retired MajorTommy Baker, delivering a compassionate address. A reception was held in the courthouse following the ceremony with light refreshments served. 

Have You Seen Me? A Guide to the Native Bees at Risk of Extinction (And How You Can Hep them)

This is part of a series with <u>Perfect Earth Project</u>, a nonprofit dedicated to toxic-free, nature-based gardening, on how you can be more sustainable in your landscapes at home.

It's winter. The trees are bare, the ground is (hopefully) covered in fallen leaves, and the palette of the landscape is muted. While it might look barren, there is a whole world living just out of sight. "Native bees might not be buzzing now," says Sarah Kornbluth, a field associate in Invertebrate Zoology at the American Museum of Natural History. "But they are all around us, hibernating in soil, stems, cavities, standing dead vegetation, and leaf litter, ready to emerge next spring." There are more than 3,600 described species of native bees in North America, from large fuzzy bumblebees to tiny metallic green gems, some sporting masks and others flaunting their extra-long antennae, living in forests, deserts, tundra, meadows—basically anywhere there are flowers. While they might not get as much attention as, say, monarch butterflies, they are vital pollinators in our ecosystem and food web. They are also in trouble. Like many pollinators, native bees are struggling due to habitat loss and pesticide use.

Grow native plants in your garden.

Native insects co-evolved with native plants. They're part of an intricate food web system. For most organisms, non-native plants are like "plastic fruit in a fruit bowl," says Kornbluth. "It may look good, but they won't be able to eat it." While nectar-eating insects are able to enjoy the sugary, calorie-rich nectar from a wide range of flowers, "pollen, which bees need to feed their young, is more likely to come from the local native species that they have been coevolving with them for many thousands of years," says Kornbluth

Don't use pesticides.

Even organic ones. Pesticides (and that includes insecticides, herbicides, and fungicides) don't discriminate and will kill all insects—not just the ones you're targeting. When selecting plants at the nursery, ask if they've been treated with pesticides of any kind, especially neonicotinoids, a systemic insecticide that is absorbed by the entire plant rendering every part poisonous to pollinators.

Provide nesting spots.

Native bees nest in the ground and in stems and wood piles. "It's important to remember that the standing dead vegetation you see is full of bees," says Kornbluth. Try not to cut back stems when flowers are done blooming, butleave them for the bees. how pretty it is all winter long. "Embracing a plant's complete life cycle-from seedlings in spring to seed head or grass mound in winter-is a Piet Oudolf trademark," says Bishop of the visionary Dutch landscape designer who created the garden's master plan. "By not deadheading, we allow the life cycle to stay on display and integrate into design year-round. And this decay becomes abundant living matter and nest material for pollinators." It's also beautiful. "I love the aesthetic: the decay, structure, and different textures of every plant-they each have their own But if you must cut some stems back, Kornbluth advises leaving last year's stems as high as you can. While you're at it, leave the leaves. In addition to feeding the soil, fallen leaves provide insulation for ground-nesters, like bumblebees and mining bees, as well as other hibernating organisms. "It prevents the surface of the earth from getting too cold, which impacts their survival over the winter," says Kornbluth.

Look and learn.

"Do a small insect safari at home," suggests Kornbluth. feels when finding new species in her garden. "Give yourself the opportunity to be meditative and peaceful," says Kornbluth. See who's coming to eat. What do you notice about them? What plants are they visiting? When are they appearing?



TFGC HISTORY BOOK BY: CATHY DONALDSON



The Tennessee Federation of Garden Clubs has a proud history of nearly 100 years. How much of that history do you know? You may have seen some of our history in the three books published in 1947, 1963 and 1991. Those books have become rare through the years so consider yourself lucky if you have one or seen one in your club or local library.

One of our past presidents Alice Robertson Overton thought we should write a fourth edition and donated to that purpose before her death. Several of our TFGC Racheff Board of Governors have taken an interest in Racheff's history and the materials stored in the vault at our state headquarters. Linda Ford and Carole Whited have worked on Racheff written history from previous years and have interviewed previous board members and neighborhood adults who visited Mr. Racheff or his house when they were kids. As required by our TFGC policies and procedures, we have tried to collect the two-year files of each previous state president to preserve their activities and files in the fireproof vault. Martha Frink and I have collected past issues of the Volunteer Gardener for reference materials of each administration and district and club activities across the state. For our 75thanniversary, we displayed memorabilia at our 2001 Knoxville convention for President Juanita Allinder.

As we approach 100 years, Denise Thorne has interested us in compiling our history before our return visit to the historic Read House for our 2025 convention in Chattanooga. We have been recruiting past presidents to donate writing or files about their two years for our TFGC history book. Unfortunately several of our presidents from the past 34 years are deceased so we have lost their personal remembrances and recollections. The writing of this fourth history will help preserve our past and its personalities and accomplishments before more is lost.
